The rainy, unsettled spring weather brought me one of my scariest rides just a few weeks ago. I went out under sunny skies, minutes later I was under a fierce lightning storm very close over the treetops, with intense hail, to boot!



I kept telling myself that the

lightening wouldn't strike me because of the much taller trees. But, it could have hit a tree near me, which could have caused the tree to explode. I researched this a bit, and found that the reason this happens is that because a bolt of lightning is actually hotter than the surface of the sun. When a bolt strikes a tree it super-heats the sap throughout the tree and water in the sap turns to steam. This happens in a split second, steam erupts and it can literally blow the bark off the tree and have it explode. Not what you want to hear when riding alone in the woods!

enhance and engage the equestrian community. We discussed ideas for engaging our membership, fundraising and possible improvement projects.



On March 9th of this year, Mary found her beloved Morgan gelding, "Dave", dead in his stall with no obvious reason. It is believed to have been an aneurism.

It took 2+ years for me to find Dave (Dragonsmead Battle Hymn) after my beloved Tigger was badly kicked and had to be put down. I made my friends crazy by sending them photos of horses I'd tried... and tried... for years, which it was! They were good sports but one finally said, "Stop already! Just show me the horse you get when you get it!"

So, I'd gone back to Massachusetts to judge a dog show where my Morgan horse friend, Nancy Caisse, came to watch. She came with a mission; to show me a horse that a friend of hers wanted to find a forever home for. We drove up to New Hampshire to their farm that afternoon; got out of the car and were greeted by the breeders and walked toward the barn where Dave was in a cross tie. The barn doors were open and he caught my eye as we climbed the hill and I caught his eye. He never stopped looking at me as I entered the barn and gave him a pat. It was love at first sight! I found out that you can be "chosen by a horse" (There is a nice book by that title)! I



rode him that day and the next day I drove him making tight turns between the snow banks along their driveway! It was April! He was obedient and listened to me. The next day I flew back home and the vet check was done. He cleared and it was history! He was mine! When he got here I had him gelded as he was one of about a dozen stallions. The owners had been breeding him for 3 years and they were ready for him to have a retirement in a forever home. Well, it was forever, but much too short!

Dave was 11 when I got him and had been trained by the Amish, who used him as a breeding stallion before he was bought by the people I bought him from. I learned something interesting about Amish farmers. If they bought or bred a stud that was dangerous in any way, they'd geld him rather than have him pass on a bad attitude. They figured that horses had to be good with standing and waiting at church, being fed by their children and taking them to school. They wanted their studs to be able to "make" good horses rather than perpetuate bad attitudes, no matter how pretty they were. Dave was bred by one of these farmers with high standards and was every bit as they hoped he be! I can vouch for that!



He was always a gentleman whether in the barn, on trails with or without other horses, he stood at the horse trailer without pawing and once I left a saddle (by accident) where he could reach it and he never touched it! He took care of me in every way, way beyond my imagination could ever have dreamed of! While I can never replace him, I AM looking for a new Morgan horse partner. Hope it doesn't take 2 years!

Roy was 34 last March 11. He was a Morgan and was born at Crown Morgans (Nancy Eidam) in Umatilla, Oregon, as "Crown Royalton." I started riding him as a student of Nichole Walters in 2003. I bought him shortly thereafter. Trained in dressage, he had a varied career as a stud horse, showing, as a school horse, and for the last 14 years of his life, a fabulous trail horse. He became sick with complications from colic and died about 36 hours later, on April 20. Folks who knew him over the years remarked on his friendly, yet sometimes feisty disposition. He was a tough guy; I rode him regularly up to three



days before he got sick. He was absolutely adorable and I will never forget him!
