Nature's Diary

If everything outside at your house turned yellow over the last few weeks, including your car, then blame a male. No, not your husband! No, blame the male Douglas Fir tree. He is scattering his pollen from the tiny 'male' cones to the four winds in hopes that each pollen grain will find a much larger female cone and pollinate one of the many seeds tucked under each 'scale' of the cone.





What I did not know is that the Douglas fir, *Pseudotsuga menziesii*, is not a true fir at all! It differs from true firs by having cones which are pendant, (hanging down from the branch) as in pines or spruces. True firs have erect cones. Another obvious difference is that Douglas fir cones have conspicuous 3-lobed



bracts or "rat tails," which protrude beyond each cone scale, while true firs do not.

In either case, every Douglas fir has both the Male and Female 'cones', so it can basically self-pollinate. They also have a somewhat cyclical seed production, wherein about every 6 years they have a SUPER production year, shedding many times the normal number of fertilized cones. Ask me how I know. (See me bending over picking up the hundreds and hundreds of cones that clog my lawn).

The good thing is that the pollen grains from the Doug fir are quite large as pollen goes, so are easily scrubbed from the air by a good rain, of which we all know there is no shortage. So, it's going to 'rain' one thing or the other; water or yellow dust. Take your pick!

Meet Our Judges

Kimberly Mitchell

Kimberly Mitchell is an FEI dressage trainer operating out of Cedar Meadow Farm in Snohomish, WA. She is a USDF Bronze, Silver, and Gold Medalist, having earned all aboard her non-traditional dressage horse, Oso Grande (Teddy Bear). She trains regularly with Alyssa Pitts and has participated in clinics and symposiums with Anne Gribbons, Debbie McDonald, Scott Hassler, Janet Foy and Charlotte Dujardin.

Kim has an interesting background in teaching, having graduated with her Master's of Arts in Teaching from Willamette University in 2008. She spent a short period of time working in public schools in Oregon before moving back home to Washington. She realized that while she enjoyed teaching, working in the schools wasn't necessarily where her passion lay - so she interned to become a PATH Intl. Certified Instructor and eventually an Advanced Instructor, and worked at a local therapeutic riding center.

This varied background gives her more insight into working with different riding styles and types of riders. As a result she is extremely flexible and adaptive and very happy to work with challenges - both with the rider and the horse.

Kellie Larsen

Kellie is an FEI level rider, USDF Bronze Medalist, USDF 'L' Judge, and Certified Positive Riding Instructor with 30 years of knowledge and training. She specializes in teaching in a fun and positive environment. Every horse is different, with different conformation, different personalities, different levels of confidence, trust and history.

Training is focused on students gaining riding tools, in which they learn to identify the issue/problem in the training and come up with a solution on their own; correct position for the rider and how this can affect the horse; general training guidelines, basics and principles and how to really communicate with your horse.

Jane Judson

Jane Judson has been teaching for nearly 30 years with a focus in dressage for the past 15. She is a USDF 'L' Graduate with Distinction, USDF Bronze Medalist and USDF Assoc Instructor Training through 2nd Level. Jane has a background in classical dressage, cross country, trail riding and western. She is currently focused on 'French Classical Schooling' with interests also in jumping, hacking out and Working Equitation. Jane is based in Carnation, WA at Hilltop Haven Equestrian but does travel for clinics throughout the year.

Jane's teaching is based in traditional French Classical dressage. As a fifth-year Instructor-in-Training of Philippe Karl's 'Ecole de Legerete', Jane is one of only three instructors in the USA to have successfully completed the Teacher's Basic course. She is now in the process of taking the required exams towards official certification.
