
The winner will be announced at the Awards Banquet. Please think about applying NOW! Don't wait until the last minute. Applicants do NOT have to be club members.

I had a call from Lothar's daughter, Christie, this morning, letting me know he had slipped away last night after several years of increasingly compromised health. Our friendship spanned well over 30 years, Sid was in my care from his youth till age 33, our daughters showed together as teenagers and we shared a long family history.

As many of you know, Lothar's interest in The Park and horse activities extended far beyond his own personal enjoyment. He and his late wife, Carolyn, shepherded the last of LWSC's open horse shows, like me, he was a founding trustee of the Bridle Trails Park Foundation, he served as a TD to many regional dressage shows for years and was a driving force in the creation of The Washington State Horse Park. Being a surgeon by trade, Lothar was instrumental in creating local triage capability at Seattle hospitals and glued more than one of us back together on the side.

A patriot to the end, he chose to leave on July 4th following the example of such founding fathers as John Adams.

Lake Washington Saddle Club Field Trip!

Pegasus Training and Rehabilitation Center

Lake Washington Saddle Club members toured the Pegasus Training and Rehabilitation Center located in Redmond, Washington.



When researching places for members to tour, the best description found of the facility was from a 2007 Seattle PI article by Dick Rockne titled *"Mayo Clinic for Thoroughbreds meets the Four Seasons"*. After the tour, it was crystal clear what he meant.

After you pass through the automatic PEGASUS inscribed iron gates, the drive takes you up into the most beautifully manicured 100-acre estate that houses the state of the art training and rehabilitation facilities.

Pegasus is the vision of Dr. Mark Dedomenico. The Doctor toured different barns around the country and brought all the best ideas back to Washington to build Pegasus. There are about 30 full time staff on-including staff on-site to care for horses 24x7.

Below is a list of amenities in the barns:

- Hay steamers No dust or any chance of mold
- Spraymaster System for insect control above the stalls
- Stalls built for maximum ventilation/airflow and Softstall flooring that supports joints, tendons and ligaments
- Rubber brick pavers throughout the barns and property to provide traction and the safest environment possible
- Fire Prevention System
- Scales to monitor nutrition
- Eurocisers
- Polytrack footing in arenas and around 5/8 mile track

The Rehabilition Center includes:

- Hyberbaric Oxygen Chamber
- Nuclear Scintigrapher
- Coldwater Therapy
- Whole Body Vibration Therapy
- Hydrohorse water treadmill
- Equine Swimming Pool
- Equine Solarium

The facility was awe inspiring, but more so is the story of survival and treatment of a horse that survived a barn fire. Her owner brought her to Pegasus after other vets had recommended putting her down. The mare has responded well to the Hypebaric Oxygen Therapy and is thriving today because of her treatment at Pegasus.
